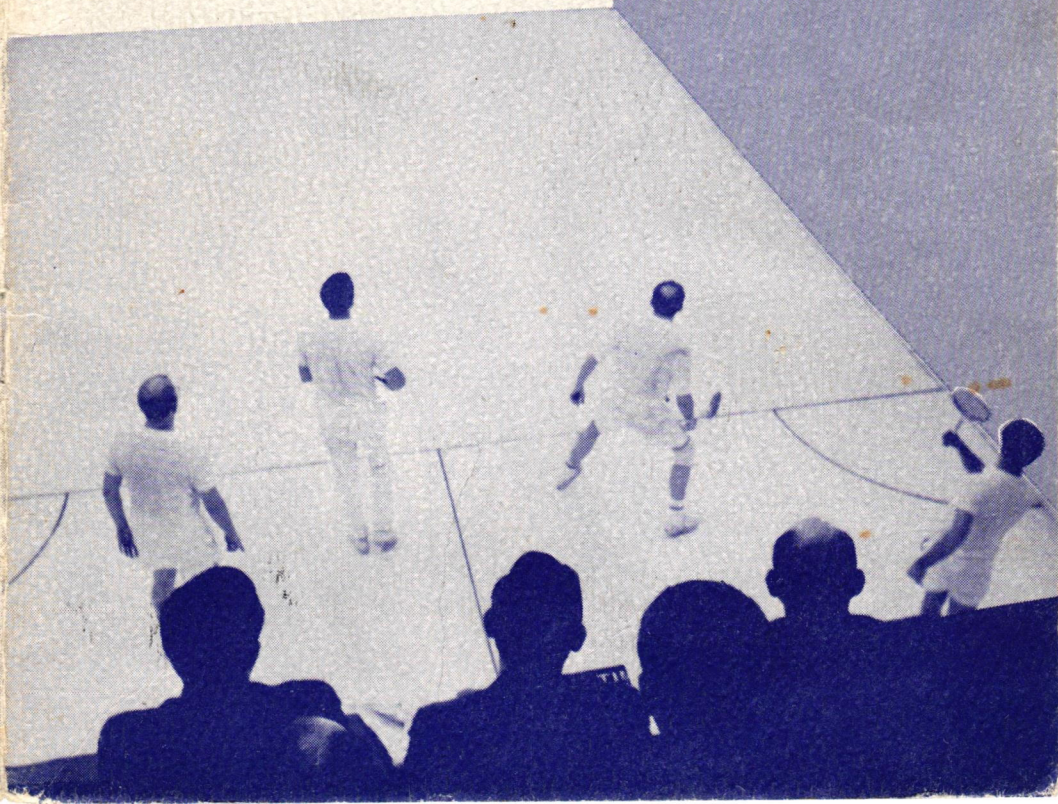

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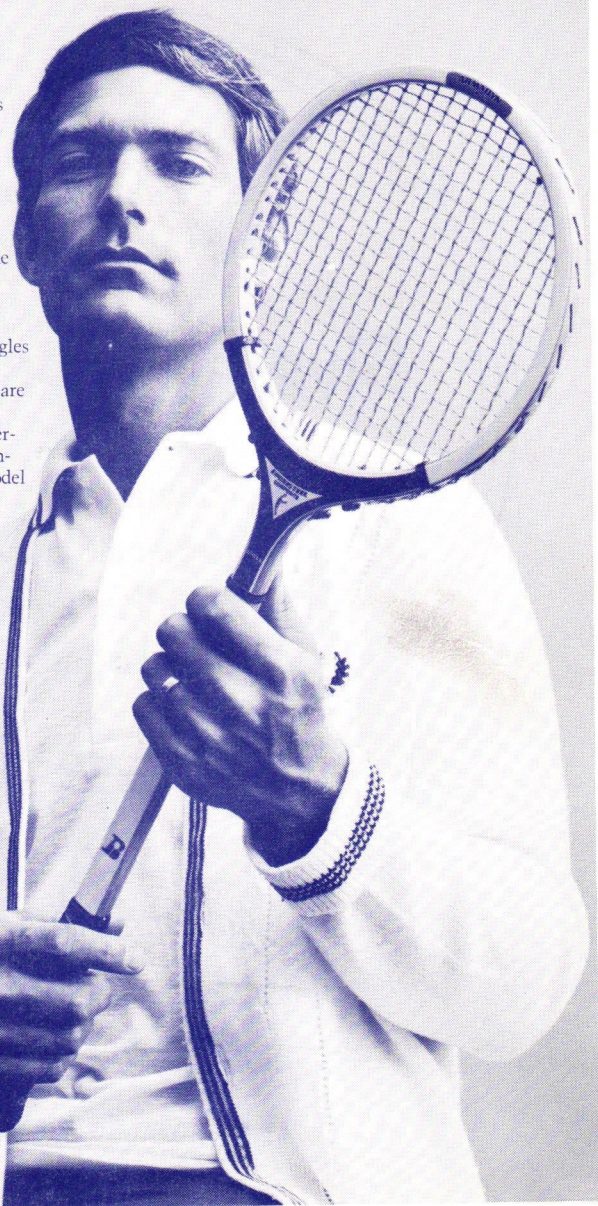
Competition Model—For those who prefer a steel shaft for reduced wind resistance. Puts weight in the head for extra power.

LAMBLE: 25 STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

At 55 he can't reach the short shots as he once did. His knees, twice operated on, have betrayed him. But today, seven years after his last state championship, William E. Lamble can look back with pride on the finest squash record ever compiled by a Maryland player.

He won ten state single titles, including eight straight from 1947 to 1954. And he captured 15 state doubles championships, including seven straight from 1956 to 1962. Most of these came with George Doetsch as a partner. So, during a 16-year stretch Lamble won at least one state championship each year except 1955.

And in 1972-73, with the cartilages gone from his knees and the quick movement missing from his stride, Lamble will still be out to win them all.

"I still play singles now and then with the boys for money," he said, "but mostly it's doubles."

A native of Baltimore, Lamble attended The Johns Hopkins University where he captained the tennis team for three years and was a member of the wrestling team for two years.

After college he joined the Southern Packing Company, Inc., a food processing operation on South Carey Street started by his father. Lamble is now president and also heads the William Grecht Company, a storage and real estate firm.

He took up squash at the old Baltimore Athletic Club in 1939. From a loose organization, run primarily from the old Racquet Club, he has watched the state squash association grow. Together with Sam Silber, Lamble helped put squash on a formal association basis here.

"We've progressed tremendously and I think the association will continue to grow," said Lamble who served as MSSRA president from 1962 to 1964

Squash centered around the Maryland Club, Baltimore Country Club, Racquet Club and Baltimore Athletic Club when Lamble took up the game.

The old Racquet Club was absorbed into the University Club in 1940, and the B.A.C., owned by Jim Lacy, Sr., was sold to the University of Baltimore in the mid-1940s.

Lamble is proud of his role of interesting the U. S. Naval Academy in squash. Working with Art Potter, the current Navy coach, Lamble helped Navy get started in local tournaments at the Baltimore clubs as well as in national tournaments.

"I've gotten a great thrill from helping the Navy kids," he said. "Did you know that's its now a required sport for one-year at the Academy."

Of his long string of tournament victories, Lamble most vividly recalls the three matches he played with Gene O'Connor for the state championship. Lamble won all three times with one match going to overtime in the fifth. Lamble calls these O'Connor duels "the toughest matches I've ever played."

Topping his list of thrills, however, was the National Senior Doubles title he and George Doetsch won in 1963. After upsetting the number one team of the Hahn brothers, Joe and Ed, in five games in the semis, Lamble-Doetsch beat Hunter Lott and Jim Gwathney, 3-1, for the championship.

Lamble still retains his crisp rail and corner shots and the aggressive, heady style of play he learned when, as he puts it, "the emphasis was more on thinking and finesse than on physical stamina."

Changes toward a livelier squash ball, he contends, have led to longer matches with endurance becoming a key factor rather than shot-making.

"But this is still a game of thinking; you can't just go out there and bang the ball about," he said.

An unfortunate trend in Baltimore, according to Lamble, is the failure of this area's good younger players to go outside Maryland and play in other tournaments.

"We used to play in all the tournaments," he said. "To get really good you can't just play the same guys every day; you have to go find some new competition."

INTER-CLUB RULES

1. Players must be members of the Maryland State Squash Racquets Association and teams will be composed of five "C" players or lower.
2. Each team will play eight matches on a home and home basis with the championship being determined by a playoff between the top two teams in the final standings. Play will begin Thursday, October 19, with matches beginning at 5:30 P. M.
3. Standings will be based on the results of individual matches between players, i.e., each of the 8 team matches has a possible 5 points to be won or lost.
4. The results of the individual matches must be sent in writing to the League Chairman's office by the winning team captain no later than noon of the following day.
5. No postponement of matches will be permitted unless cleared through the League Chairman. If postponement is granted, the match will be re-scheduled for the following Friday unless unusual circumstances would intervene.
6. In addition to promptly reporting the results of the matches, it will be the responsibility of the team captain to see to it that his team of five men arrives on time for all matches.
7. The Green Diamond will be the official ball for all team matches.
8. By the scheduled starting time, the home team should post its starting line-up. The visiting team will then have the choice of determining who plays whom. But after the pairings have been posted, they may not be changed unless a player cannot be there, in which case it will be permissible to enter a substitute. Under no circumstances may a player participate in more than one match.
9. If at least one player desires a referee for his match, a referee should be obtained if there is someone available and willing to do so; otherwise, play will be according to the published rules of the United States Squash Racquets Association.
10. Once a player has participated for one team in Inter-Club competition, under no circumstances will he be permitted to play in subsequent matches for another team even though he may be a member of more than one group.
11. Players are reminded that squash is a gentlemen's game. Conduct during all matches should always reflect this fact.

SQUASH POINTERS FROM A PRO

John Warzycki was born 50 years ago in St. Louis, Missouri. In 1953 and 1954 he won the National Professional Squash Singles Championship. He has been the squash and tennis professional at the Baltimore Country Club since 1967.

In the following article he gives some squash tips for inexperienced and experienced players.

Q: What is the most important shot in squash?

A: "I'd say up and down the wall (rail) shots and cross court shots. Both should be hit low and hard to be effective."

Q: What is the best way to improve your game?

A: "I was always told to practice three times a week by myself in 30 minute sessions and then to play the best players I could find. I always tried to stick to that advice."

Q: What can you tell us about the squash grip?

A: "I see a lot of good athletes from other sports playing with an incorrect grip and it bothers me. You need a good grip to start with, something like the Continental grip in tennis."

Q: Do you change grips for backhand and forehand in squash?

A: "Maybe at first you'd change a little, but for most players there should be little or no change. The game is just too fast for it."

Q: Why does Navy produce so many good players?

A: "They are well-schooled, I think, in the rail and cross court shots, and they volley well. They also have good pace on their shots."

Q: What court strategy would you suggest for singles?

A: "It's always good to vary your game and to use a little imagination. It's dangerous when you rely on one shot for too long. The general consensus of squash people is that a good cross court and up and-down game will defeat a good soft game."

Q: How about strategy in doubles?

A: "Don't get shot happy, that's my advice. You can't go for winners too quickly or you'll get murdered."

SHORT SHOTS. . .

There are now two singles and one doubles court in Columbia. These courts were opened last year at the Columbia Athletic Club. In addition to squash they are used for paddleball and handball. Several singles tournaments plus ladder play will be held at the club this season. For further information call 730-6744.

Last season an Australian squash team visited the Baltimore area, putting on exhibitions at the Baltimore Country Club. A cocktail party for the group was held at Sam Silber's house. Sam says they take squash seriously in Australia and that the city of Sydney has 200 squash courts.

THE WOMEN

A Baltimore Invitational Women's Tournament, featuring nationally-ranked singles and doubles players, will be held December 8, 9 and 10 at the Racquet Club and the Baltimore Country Club.

This will be the first women's tournament on a national level ever held in Maryland, and it is a good indicator that in this state the ladies' role as purely spectator during squash matches has ended.

More than 50 women are expected to participate in women's tournaments and club play this season in Maryland. Women must be MSSRA members to compete.

The tournament schedule will include a statewide singles and doubles tournament plus inter-club play. Club matches will start in early November and are held Wednesdays beginning at 10:00 A.M. The Racquet Club and Baltimore Country Club each field two teams while the Towson Y has one team.

line up → The singles tournament will be wide open this year since the departure of Diana Schaeffer, the dominant player in the area for the past two years. Diana and her husband, Bob, left in September for Boulder, Colorado.

Women's notes: Margaret Riehl, of the Racquet Club, has been selected to the executive board of the United States Women's Squash Racquets Association. The group meets three times a year Mrs. Riehl urges women of all ages to join a club and take up squash. There is no age limit or minimum age requirement.

Baltimore Country Club

(4712 Club Road, Baltimore, Md. 21210 . 889-4400)

Incorporated in 1898, the Baltimore Country Club came late to squash prominence in the area. Three non-regulation singles courts were erected at the club after World War I, but golf and tennis continued unrivaled as the major athletic activities until the 1960s.

Finally, in 1965, after squash adherents had been seeking new courts for more than 20 years, a \$100,000 addition was added to the club, providing Maryland with some of its finest courts.

Fred Smith, squash chairman, reports that Haswell Franklin won the A singles tournament at the club last year, whipping Dan Senft in the final. Joe Cowan, ex-football and lacrosse star at The Johns Hopkins University, won both the B and C singles, defeating Al Weaver in the Bs and Ed Cooper in the Cs.

Joe Lacy and Jack Morrison beat Fred Smith and Bob Williams for the A doubles championship. In the B doubles it was George Boynton and Al Weaver over John Beatson and Jack Bremmerman for the title. Joe Fitzpatrick, Jr. teamed with Tom J. O'Donnell, Jr. to win the C doubles over Thomas Holden and Fred Steinman.

The club's member-guest doubles competition, a popular tournament which comes early in the season, was won by Joe Lacy and ~~Mickey Webster~~ over Jim Lacy and Tom Schweizer. A fine banquet traditionally follows this tournament.

The Maryland Club was incorporated in 1858 and stood for 33 years at 24 West Franklin Street (the site of the present Central YMCA) before moving to East Eager Street.

Since a \$75,000 wing with squash courts was added to the club in 1928, the facility has been a focal point for the game in Maryland. The most and perhaps the best players in the state can be found at the Maryland Club. Lunch hour games in summer and winter are popular here.

Squash action at the club last year saw William Rice win his first club championship with a 3-0 victory over Henry Ciccarrone. Fast-improving Sandy Martin beat Tom Greene, 3-0, for the B title; and Peter Van Dyke won the C crown over Bill Dorsey 3-0. Dorsey earlier had captured the D singles with a 3-2 win over Buzzy Buditz.

In doubles, Joe Lacy and Mickey Webster beat A.C. Hubbard and William Rice, 3-1, for the club championship. Luther Ditch and Bob Voelkel edged Sandy Martin and Jack Fetting, 3-2, for the B title and Tyler Kohler teamed with Phil Iglehart for a 3-0 victory over Bob Kent and Stach Malisewski for the C crown.

The Racquet Club

(2 Tower Lane, Roland Park, Baltimore, Maryland . 235-6321)

Bob Voelkel and John Riehl, brother-in-laws, built the Racquet Club out of an old and unused girl's school gymnasium. The facility opened in late 1968 and now is the only place in Baltimore where the game can be played around the clock.

Members in the club are given keys to the club doors and can play whenever they can find a game. Midnight matches are rumored while early morning games, with participants numbly starting play at 6:30 A. M., are not uncommon.

Only one intra-club tournament was held last season and it produced a surprise winner. In the club doubles John Menton and Homer Schwartz upset Voelkel and Riehl (3-1) for the championship.

The Towson YMCA was started in 1947 but didn't settle at its present 17-acre site on West Chesapeake Avenue until 1959. At that time the Y took over a former girls' building known as Kelso Home.

A major addition to this first facility opened on July 13, 1967. This new complex included a gymnasium, swimming pool, health clubs, basketball courts, handball courts and two squash courts.
