Navy swept to the finals of the State Singles last January with Craig Dawson beating Randy Fisher for the crown. But the most exciting matches of the traditional MSSRA Banquet Night were the Women's and Class C singles.

Ann Monahan, of Arlington, Va., beat Baltimore's Nancy Miller 3-1 in women's play. But this was the closest final in the event we have ever seen.

Tim Schweizer would like to forget the C singles final. He had Stuart Janney 10-4 in the fifth game before losing the match.

The U.S. National Doubles came to Baltimore in late March. Tom Schweizer, of Baltimore, and Ed Hahn, of Philadelphia, fresh from a victory in the Canadian Senior Doubles, seemed a good bet to capture the National Seniors. They reached the semi-final only to lose by one point in overtime in the fifth game to Jinx Johnson and Jack Bolling. Johnson-Bolling lost in the finals to Victor Elmaleh and Tread Ketcham. Joe Lacy, who won five of six local doubles tournaments, teamed with Sandy Martin to defeat the Michigan State champions in the first round of the Nationals. Lacy-Martin gave the top-seeded Plerce brothers, of Philadelphia, a tough match before losing 3-1 in the quarters. The Plerces eventually lost in the finals to Jim Zug and Vic Neiderhoffer who were playing together as a team for the first time.

The growth in squash activity continues steadily in Maryland among both men and women. The Association now has well over 200 members, and there are at least 50 women who play squash in Maryland. A junior program, highly successful last year, is entering its second season.

In addition to a women's National tournament this year, the MSSRA will sponsor the National singles and team matches at the Naval Academy and will then host its own National Invitational Doubles Tournament.

One sad note: Southey Miles, a squash playing member of the Baltimore Country Club and Maryland Club, died of a cerebral hemorrhage this year while on vacation in Austria. He was 52 and was the donor of the Women's Singles Bowl.

Over the weekend of February 15-17 and on Monday, February 18, our Maryland State Squash Racquets Association will host the 1974 National Singles championships.

Who will ever forget 1963 when we last held these matches? Remember the pulsating five game semi-final between former National Champions, Henri Salaun and Harry Conlon, and Washington's dramatic 3-2 win in the team finals; and then there was the emergence of a new star on the squash horizon in the presence of Victor Niederhoffer.

To hold championships like these is a monumental job since actually four separate tournaments - the national singles, veterans, seniors, and team matches - are being held simultaneously and there is also the responsibility for entertaining countless players and friends of squash from all over the North American continent. Some persons have said our Association isn't interested enough in the game on a big time basis to support an undertaking of this magnitude, but I believe they are wrong. Nearly fifty percent of our membership has already volunteered to make this the finest squash tournament possible. I appreciate this vote of confidence in Maryland squash, and you can rest assured that with your support we will succeed.

Most of you will be asked to be a sponsor for the tournaments. This is really the key to our financial success which after all is essential. Our expenses for the weekend are projected at close to \$25,000. Each player participating will pay a racquet fee, but this will only underwrite less than half on the monies needed. In return for being a sponsor (\$100.00) you will receive the following:

- Reserved seat at either court one or two for all matches through the semifinals with preferential seating for the finals of all four tournaments.
- (2) Open bar Friday night, plus cocktail party and dinner dance Saturday night.
- (3) Lunches Saturday, Sunday, and Monday plus Sunday party.
- (4) Player souvenir of weekend.
- (5) Special recognition through listing in program.

It is not often that you get an opportunity to see the Neiderhoffers and the Salauns play, especially with National championships at stake, and I know all of you will enjoy this rare privilege. Let's give our visitors the finest possible memories of hospitality in the "land of pleasant living!"

Baltimore rallied from a 6-4 deficit to defeat Washington 7-6 in the annual Fitzgerald Cup matches played in Washington, D. C. in January.

The victory was Baltimore's 12th in the 25-match series. It marked the first time Baltimore had won the cup on Washington's courts since 1955.

Tom Schweizer, Peter Parker and Jim Hense all won 3-2 matches in the last three positions to provide the margin of victory. Other Baltimore winners were Mickey Webster, Bill Rice, Gil Rothrock and Peter Wolff.

JOE LACY: MR. DOUBLES

Joe Lacy's record in doubles during the past two years is, like his entire game, a model of consistency. He has won 9 of the last 10 Maryland doubles tournaments in which he has played, and he has combined with six different partners to put this streak together.

Last season Joe won five of six tournaments in which he competed locally. In addition he and Sandy Martin reached the guarter-finals of the U.S. National Doubles which were played in Baltimore. Off their performance in this tournament, Lacy-Martin are sure to be ranked near or in the top ten in doubles nationally.

Joe is the reigning Maryland State, Maryland Club, BCC Invitational, Racquet Club Invitational and BCC Mixed Invitational champion. His only loss came during the finals of the BCC club tournament to Jim Lacy and George Doetsch.

A native of Baltimore, Joe graduated in 1954 from Loyola College where he captained the tennis team for two years. After two years in the service, he joined his father's company, James J. Lacy Co. which manufactures iron castings. He become president in 1958 and started another corporation, Joseph J. Lacy, Inc., in 1965. Last year the firm acquired Pennsylvania Bronze in Harrisburg, Pa.

Always interested in racquet sports, Joe started playing squash after the service. He joined the Maryland Club in 1960 and won his first major State championship in 1963. That year he and Jack Miller won the State doubles over Bill Lamble and George Doetsch.

Until 1965 Joe played a lot of singles, but then a congenital back problem flared up making it difficult for him to endure the constant bending and turning that singles requires.

Over the years he has developed a doubles game based on patience, keen anticipation and an ability to keep his opponent off balance with a mixture of short shots and lobs.

"Patience is a big part of my game," he said, "but that's not all there is to doubles. You have to be tough and competitive, you have to watch your partner all the time and communicate with him, and you have to pick good partners."

He picked communications up early in his doubles career when he played frequently with Jack Miller.

"I didn't know anything about doubles then," he said, "and Jack would speak up and keep telling me things such as to move up, go back or cover."

Communication was a key to the later success of Joe and his older brother. Jim. Together they won seven straight Maryland doubles titles and then broke up after the 1972 season with their string still intact.

"Jim is a very smart player and he is definitely the best clutch player I've ever seen in this area," Joe said.

Joe's current partner, Sandy Martin, has made remarkable progress in doubles during the past two years. Together they plan to play in several tournaments outside Maryland this year, including the Merion Invitation in Philadelphia, the Nationals and perhaps a New York event.

"With a little more experience, Sandy could become a top-ranking player," Joe said.

Sandy teamed with Joe for three local titles last year, including the Maryland State, Maryland Club and BCC club. In the Racquet Club Invitational Joe won with Bob Voelkel and in the BCC Mixed Invitational he won with Margaret Riehl.

Two years ago Joe won two of his five championships with Mickey Webster as a partner. He also won with Bob Voelkel, Jack Morrision and Jim Lacy.

ART POTTER AT NAVY

The Maryland State Squash Racquets Association has had a long and pleasant relationship with the Naval Academy through its squash coach. Art Potter. The Navy team was 15-2 last season and finished third nationally.

The following commentary on Navy squash and on Mr. Potter and his son, Art Potter, Jr., is taken from the foreward to the former's well-known squash manual.

His Squash Racquet teams have won 222 and lost 46 matches. As interim varsity tennis coach, his teams won 22 and lost 12 matches.

The Naval Academy Squash Team has won the National Collegiate Title three times and tied for the title in two other seasons. Seventeen midshipmen have achieved All-American and four have been Rhodes Scholars. Mr. Potter attended the University of Pennsylvania, Maryland University, Springfield College, and the University of Delaware and has B.S., M.S., and MeD. Degrees. In 1958 he was chairman of the Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium Fund Raising Committee. Since 1965 he has made research studies of the military physical education and sports programs in Europe. Great Britlan, Japan and the United States for the Navy. He is the author of several research monographs, a tennis manual, and a widely read squash racquets book. The National Intercollegiate Squash Racquets Tournament trophy is known as the Potter Trophy.

JUNIOR PROGRAM IN SECOND YEAR

On Saturday mornings at 8 A.M., when most of us are still rubbing sleep from our eyes, a group of interested men and eager youngsters will gather at the Racquet Club in Roland Park to play and learn squash. The scene will be repeated each week this year from October until early Spring to provide encouragement and support for the development of junior squash players in Maryland.

The program begins its second year on October 6 and is being conducted under the auspices of the MSSRA. Designed for boys and girls from age 12 up, the program features professional instruction, court time, and State and National competition.

"The objectives of the program are to expose these youngsters to squash and to provide them with good instruction," said Tom Reilly, an organizer of the program. "Hopefully a long range benefit will be to enable some of these players to receive financial aid to college on the strength of their squash ability."

Mr. Reilly, along with Dr. Doug Talbott, were instrumental last year in starting the program. Eddle Scheaffer provided the instruction.

Community support of the effort has been excellent. John Riehl and Bob Voelkel provided the facilities at the Racquet Club, and Art Potter, the Navy squash coach, has supplied a film and some squash instruction manuals.

In addition, John Warzycki has been teaching youngsters to play on an informal basis at the Baltimore Country Club for several years.

One result of the junior program last year was that attendance at the Saturday sessions, which last from 8 to 10 A.M., was greater at the end of the year than at the beginning. This is indicative of the level of interest as well as the fine guidance provided by Eddie Scheaffer.

The atmosphere of the Junior Development Program is low-key and fun. Competition is secondary. Sparking an interest in squash among the youngsters is of prime importance.

Expansion is one of the goals of the program this year. The plan is to involve more clubs such as the Maryland Club, Towson YMCA, Baltimore Country Club and the Columbia Squash Club in the activity. The addition of these groups plus another from Harford County will enable strong and varied inter-club competition.

Along with inter-club competition, the Baltimore program plans to seek matches on a junior level with other cities such as Philadelphia.

Interesting secondary schools in the program so the students can play at one of the clubs during gym time is another objective this year.

There are also special events to interest the young players. Last year these included a trip to the Naval Academy to watch the Intercollegiate Tournament. This year the program organizers will sponsor a visit from Hashim Khan. The great Detroit professional is expected to play exhibits and give instructions to the junior players during a weekend that will be announced at a later date.

Although only in its second year, the junior program is expanding its horizons. One of the reasons for the program's initial success and for its hopes for the future is the financial support it has received from the squash playing community.

WOMEN'S SQUASH

The caliber of women's squash in Maryland is progressing rapidly. A contributing factor in this upswing is the desire of the women to travel to other cities for competition and to sponsor national women's tournaments in Baltimore.

On December 7-9 the State Association will sponsor the Second Baltimore Invitational Women's Singles and Doubles Tournament. This event is sactioned by the United States Women's Squash Racquets Association and is run by Maryland women.

Also during the upcoming season the women will run the National Veteran Women's Doubles in Baltimore. This tournament will be held March 8-10 and is sponsored by the USWSRA.

Maryland women are also becoming increasingly active administratively on the national level. Sally Shand has been elected president of the USWSRA for 1973-74, Helen Lacy has been named to the Ranking Committee, and she and Margaret Riehl are now on the USWSRA's National board.

In addition, the women plan a number of squash excursions to tournaments outside the State this season. In recapping the past year we find that newcomer Ann Monahan, of Arlington, Va., won the State singles crown 3-1 over Nancy Miller. This was a close match and the best singles final the women have ever presented. Ann teamed with Dale Philippi to beat Margaret Riehl and Helen Lacy 3-1 for the State Doubles title.

In team play, Racquet Club No. 1 nipped B.C.C. No.1 for its second consecutive title.

The first and highly successful Invitational Singles and Doubles Tournament sponsored by the women found Ginny Akabane defeating Gail Ramsey 3-1 for the singles championship. Both women are from Philadelphia.

In doubles, the Philadelphia tandem of Irma Brogan and Mary O'Toole defeated Baltimoreans Margaret Riehl and Sally Shand, 3-0 in the finals.

The consolation singles winner was Dale Philippi who beat Nancy Miller, 3-1. Both women are from Baltimore.

A total of 12 teams participated in the doubles matches, including some of the top-ranked women competitors in the country. In singles, 22 players participated.

A five-women team from Baltimore captured the class B championship of the Women's Squash Racquets Tournament held in New Haven, Conn. Baltimore took the title by beating Boston and Philadelphia by 3-2 scores. Team members were Ann Monahan, Dale Philippi, Nancy Miller, Sally Shand and Margaret Riehl.

MARGARET RIEHL HONORED

Margaret Riehl, a major contributor to the rise of women's squash in Maryland, has recently been honored by the United States Women's Squash Racquets Association. The USWSRA awarded Marge its 1972 Achievement Bowl for "her enthusiastic and devoted work for the development of women's squash."

As mentioned in the women's article, Marge has been named to the National Board of the USWSRA along with Helen Lacy of Baltimore.

As a spokesman for women's squash in Baltimore and as a tireless worker on behalf of squash here, the MSSRA would like to join the USWSRA in saluting Marge for a job well done and recognition richlydeserved.
