

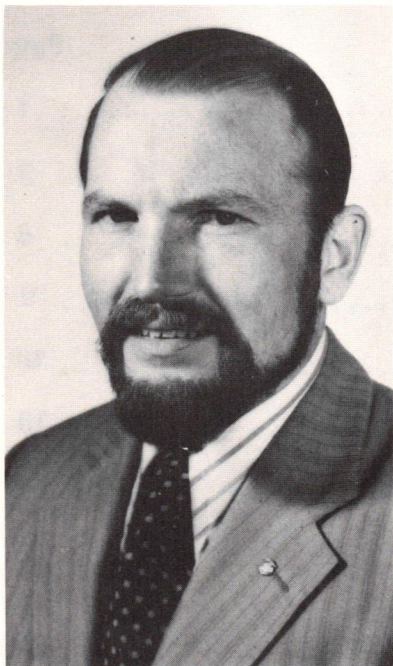

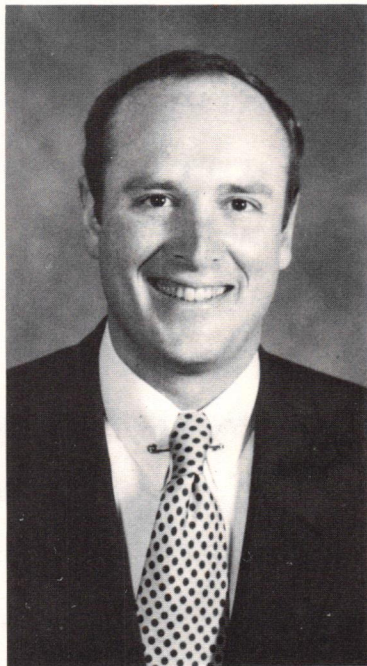



Although we will miss the exciting singles flight that has become a part of the annual Baltimore Invitation Doubles event, the breadth of play that we can expect from the quality and diversity of doubles squash is something for which to look forward. Bob Hicks, MSSRA treasurer, is our able Tournament Director for this squash event of the first magnitude.

Finally we note that this MSSRA yearbook is only one means that we use to keep you apprised of happenings in squash. All of you have been receiving **Maryland Squash News** at regular intervals. This is an excellent means for us on the Executive Committee to keep you informed of fast-breaking information. 
The MSSRA is interested in the formation of a Baltimore City Squash League. If enough players are interested, leagues will be formed to begin play in January 1981.

The Lady Jays bounced through the 1979-1980 season with a 4-3 record overall and one national ranking. In their seven intercollegiate matches, J.H.U. easily handed losses to Swarthmore (7-0), Bucknell (7-0), Franklin & Marshall (4-3), and George Washington University (5-0).

Trouble off the four walls came from Franklin & Marshall (4-3), Penn (5-2), and Wesleyan (5-2), who provided three in the loss column to J.H.U.

In non-varsity scrimmages, Round Robins were played against clubs from the University of Virginia, Frostburg, and Western Maryland. At the Penn Round Robin, J.H.U. finished third out of ten teams.

At the prestigious Howe Cup Tournament played at Yale, the Lady Jays finished thirteenth out of twenty teams, with Princeton finishing on top in a close duel with the second place finishers from Harvard.

The long practice season was interrupted by college exams and vacations, with most matches played during long weekend road trips in February. The many hours of practice logged by Nunzie Gould paid off at the National Intercollegiate Tournament at Princeton. In this double elimination draw, Nunzie lost her long first round match

against Penn's Cindy Ketterer, but then went on to win her next five matches. In a nail biting consolation against Lil Doubleday of Middlebury, Nunzie won in the fifth game on a five point tiebreaker and earned an honorable mention in the U.S. Women's Intercollegiate rankings.

After coaching for two years, Toby Gordon resigned to work full time on research at Hopkins.

With few seniors on the team lost to graduation, J.H.U. should continue to dominate what the New England coaches call, "The Southern Squash Scene".

THE RACQUET CLUB OF ROLAND PARK

The quality and quantity of squash racquets at the Racquet Club of Roland Park has increased considerably this year.

Competition for court time is intense during the evening hours virtually all year long. Court usage has been so consistently high that the management was unable to close the courts for paint and repairs. The level of play has improved markedly with many club

players being promoted from "D" to "C" and "C" to "B".

Racquet Clubbers had a reasonably good 1979-80 squash season locally, regionally, and some nationally. We take considerable pride in our members (both players and workers) who have achieved national recognition.

1. Linda Denton is ranked 20th in the Open Women's Division;
2. Paul Ellis is ranked 17th in the 35+ Division;
3. Haswell Franklin repeated as Maryland Director on the USSRA Board and continued to serve as chairman of the special committee on membership and sanctioning.
4. Denise Galambos is ranked 5th in the Girls' 18 and Under Division;
5. T. James Hense was nominated for the first Gray's Cup for his contributions to the game of squash;
6. Margaret Riehl was ranked 4th in the Women's 40+ Division;
7. Timmi Wolff was given honorable mention in the Girls' 14 and Under Division;
8. Peter Wolff served a second year as Chairman of Referees nationally and was elected to the Board of Directors of the USSRA as a director at large.

Many Racquet Clubbers took their skills on the road and distinguished themselves in regional competition. Dr. Murray Gilman won the regional "B" Division in the Insilco B/C Championships and went on to Boston to be runner-up in the "B" consolations. Linda Denton, Scott Jordan, Nancy Taylor, and Peter Wolff played in the Cleveland Invitational. Linda Denton lost in the semi-finals of the womens' event and Nancy went on to be a finalist in the same event. Jim McCaslin won the "A" consolations at the Pacific Northwest Championships.

In the MSSRA competition the Racquet Club continued to numerically dominate play but did not place its normal quota of players in the finals. In the Blue Dot Tournament, the Racquet Club produced four of the ten finalists. In the "C" event, Ron Attanasio defeated Boo Smith 3-2. In the "D" finals, Tom Gregory defeated Darryl Palmer 3-2. And in the women's event, Denise Galambos defeated Toby Gordon 3-0. In the Baltimore City Singles, the Racquet Club produced two of ten finalists with Murray Gilman defeating Paul Deitz in the "B" event and Rich Thomas defeating Allan Acton in the "C" event. In the State Singles Championships the Racquet Club once again produced four of ten finalists, with John Minkowski being defeated by Jeff Carlson in the "A's", Mike Dunn being defeated by Paul Deitz in the "B's"; and Allan Acton defeated by Lee Deskins in the "C's". Mary McGuirk was the only

Racquet Clubber to win a State Championship in her victory over Helen Lacy in the women's event.

In the MSSRA Doubles competition, Jim Tillman was the only male Racquet Clubber to reach the finals. Jim Tillman and Paul Deitz lost to Charles Fenwick and Bob Hicks in the "B" finals 3-0. However, in the women's doubles it was an all Racquet Club final with Linda Denton and Nancy Taylor defeating Joyce Hogan and Margaret Riehl 3-2 in the finals.

The Racquet Club sponsored the third annual Club Doubles Tournament with A, B, and Mixed Doubles events. In the "A Doubles" Bob Hogan and Jim McCaslin squeaked past last year's winners of John Riehl and Alex Sotir in the semi's to meet Barrett Freedlander and John Minkowski in the finals. With Barrett and John half-asleep, Bob and Jim breezed through with a 3-0 victory. In the "B" Linda Denton and Nancy Taylor defeated Mary McGuirk and Margaret Riehl 3-1. Linda Denton and Jim McCaslin outlasted Denise and Louis Galambos 3-1 in the Mixed Doubles event. The Tournament Director was asked to announce that it is still not too late for players to pay their racquet fees for this tournament!

Ladder play was instituted late this year and has sparked considerable competition among the top players with Bob Hogan, Scott Jordan, Jim McCaslin, and Peter Wolff vying for top honors.

There is some squash activity at the Racquet Club which is not well-known throughout the squash community. Four dedicated squashers drag their bodies to the doubles court to engage in mortal battle two mornings a week at 5:45 a.m. These gladiators are none other than Keith Manley, Marv Norin, Picket Riehl, and Walter Smyth. Hats off to these early birds!



BALTIMORE PLAYERS ON THE NATIONAL SCENE

Achieving numerous outstanding victories on the doubles circuit again this year, Baltimore's Sandy Martin teamed with National Men's 35+ Champion Tom Poor, of Boston, to retain their ranking of No. 3 nationally in Men's Doubles. In preparation for the first U.S. Doubles Tournament to combine Women's and Men's championships in our Charm City during March, 1981, Jim Lacy and Tom Schweizer fought to a fourth place ranking in the Seniors while Joe Lacy and Bob Voelkel cruised to seventh nationally in the Veterans.

Playing well in National Competition, Paul Ellis earned the No. 17 spot in the Men's 35's, this year owning it exclusively after sharing No. 13 in 1978/79. Other national play at all levels saw more Baltimoreans participating in sanctioned tournaments at home and away on almost every weekend from September through April. This encouraging activity led the MSSRA to acquire USSRA sanctioning for October, 1980's Fall Doubles in Open and Men's 40 events and November's Baltimore City Singles in Open, 35, 45, and 55 Men's singles. This increased play will help to supplement the National Doubles Championships in lieu of the annual Baltimore Invitational Doubles and Singles Tournament.

The 1980 Baltimore Invitational Doubles and Singles Tournament drew talent from new quarters to fill the 16 slots in the draw with No. 1 U.S. ranked Gil Mateer of Cleveland, newly teamed with John Bottger of Philadelphia preparing for their National Doubles on-slaught by their 2-hour, 5-game marathon finals victory over Poor and Martin who had earlier won a tough 4-game decision over first seeds, Mike Pierce of Philadelphia and new pro Tom Page of Cleveland. In other action, just one match before, Tom Poor defeated pro Dave Talbott of Detroit in the singles final. The score of 18/15 in the fifth avenged Tom's October Cleveland Open loss to Dave. This victory was Tom's third of the day including his singles semi-final defeat of Scott Ryan, 18/15, 15/16, 5/5. Meanwhile, David was dispatching Philadelphia pro, Ray Rodrigues, 15/13, 15/7, 13/15, 15/3. For the second consecutive year, Tom Poor had a Sunday 4-match schedule in Baltimore. 1981 should be kinder to him with the only U.S. Doubles Championship on that notorious spring weekend. Sandy says that extra year will make him too tough to carry anyway.

Junior Program: Denise Galambos again ranked U.S. #5 in Girls 18 and under. Other notable activity saw the MSSRA sponsored junior program directed by Randy Torr, ascend to 25 registrants who received ten Saturday lessons from pro Frank Cushman, then participate in several local, regional and national junior tournaments. Although they did not quite achieve the status of juniors from Canada, Seattle, Philadelphia, D.C. or Brooklyn, we were encouraged to plan to expand the 1980/81 program to include weekday practice at the Towson State University courts.

Intercollegiate activity had Baltimorean Dell Steinmann and former Hopkins student, Arshad Malik, contribute to the Penn Varsity. Steinmann was also the Philadelphia Regional Insilco "C" winner who performed well at the National Insilco finals in Boston as did Baltimore's Murray Gilman, losing a tough consolation final in the National "B" Division. All-American Jeff Carlson of the U.S. Naval Academy decisively defeated a tough, but tired, John Minkowski in the Maryland State Championship "A" Final. Carlson also led his Naval Academy team to a fifth place ranking among intercollegiate teams.

The B Flight of the Baltimore Women's Open produced some surprisingly strong players from Philadelphia, New York, Washington and Baltimore. Top-seeded Molly Pierce ran into trouble against New York's Susie Reed in the second round after defeating Toby Gordon in round one. Pierce managed to edge out a 15-11 win over Reed in the fifth game and then proceeded to defeat Baltimore's #3 seed Mary McGuirk in the semis. By comparison, #2 seed Linda Denton had an easy time. She defeated Liz Cianos, Denise Galambos, and Kathy Gregory without the loss of a game to set up the finals against Pierce. Denton emerged the victor with a 3-0 defeat of Pierce 15-10, 10 & 9.

Playoffs for third and fourth place were held in each division. For the A's Joyce Davenport defeated Diana Nyad 3-1, and in the B Flight it was Washington's Kathy Gregory over Mary McGuirk 3-1. Next years competition will be held December 5, 6, and 7 and will consist of a championship flight, an A-B combination, and doubles.

Howe Cup - The women's version of the National Team competition, was one of the highlights of the year for the area women. For the first time the Southeast Region managed to send A, B, and C teams consisting of five players per team. Baltimore combined with Washington to produce an excellent squad of players.

The A team of Joyce Hogan, Nancy Taylor, Linda Denton, Anne McNahan, and Ginney Pell did not fare to well, finishing in last place. Only Denton and Pell managed to pull out wins over New

York's Diana Nyad, and Philadelphia's Irma Brogan respectively. However, all have their sights set for 1st place next year.

The B and C teams were quite strong by comparison. Both teams made it to the finals where they both lost their bids for 1st place against strong and experienced teams from New York.

As witness to the growth in women's squash this year, three local players - Nancy Taylor, Joyce Hogan, and Linda Denton qualified for the Nationals held in Princeton, New Jersey. Margaret Riehl, past USWSRA President, also qualified for the Women's 35+ and 40+ events and brought home the only silver, finishing in 4th place in the 40+ event.

Two area women, Mary McGuirk and Denise Galambos, traveled to Chicago for the second annual National B Tournament. Both players made fine showings: Denise runner up in the consolation

flight and Mary finishing in 5th place after losing in the quarters to the eventual tournament winner.

Three Maryland women also participated in the National Women's Doubles Tournament held in Philadelphia. Joyce Hogan teamed with Philadelphia's Connie Pierce and an all home town team consisted of Linda Denton and Nancy Taylor. While Hogan and Pierce lost in the semi's of the feed in consolation, Denton and Taylor went on to win this division and take 5th place in their first national doubles bid. The National Women's Doubles Tournament will be hosted by Baltimore in March 1981. So let this be fair warning to all the area women to start sharpening up their games-it's closer than you think.

BALTIMORE INVITATIONAL DOUBLES AND SINGLES

Tom Poor had the best and the worst of times at the Baltimore Invitational Doubles and Singles squash tournament this year.

Although the 36-year old Bostonian won the singles tournament and was the finalist in the doubles, his road to glory required him to play four matches in one day, a total of 18 games, or 5½ hours of squash. As a result he wound up in the hospital, the victim of exhaustion and dehydration.

In Poor's mind, it was probably well worth the effort.

On Sunday, he beat Detroit pro Dave Talbott in the singles finals - in a grueling five game match by 15/4, 15/10, 11/15, 4/15, 18/15 scores. Earlier that morning, Poor had defeated Scott Ryan in the semifinals, by 18/15, 15/16, 15/5, 15/5 scores. Talbott had earned his way to the finals by eliminating Philadelphia pro Ray Rodriquez, winning 15/13, 15/7, 13/15, 15/3.

Twenty minutes after his well earned victory over Talbott, Poor and Baltimorean Sandy Martin, last year's finalists, were in the finals of the doubles tournament, facing John Bottger, a left hander with unique shot making ability, and Gil Mateer, the top ranked national amateur.

The final match was full of surprises. Poor/Martin were losing 1-2 in games and were behind in the fourth. At that point, Martin tried to cover for his exhausted partner. With winning drops and nicks, Martin brought the team back from 8/13 to an overtime 18/16 win. Martin played nearly single-handedly in the fifth game. Bottger and Mateer prevailed however, and won the match and championship

12/15, 15/12, 15/9, 16/18, 15/12.

In the semifinals, Poor/Martin defeated Philadelphia's Mike Pierce and former Philadelphian Tom Page 15/8, 12/15, 15/7, 15/13. Page is now the pro at the 13th Street Racquet Club in Cleveland. In the quarters, the Poor/Martin duo beat Helmut Meertz and Kit Spahr 15/9, 15/14, 15/9.

Bottger/Mateer were victorious over New York's Niko Elmaleh and Hollis Russell, easily winning the semifinal match 15/6, 15/9, 15/5. In the quarters the Bottger/Mateer team had a more difficult time against the team of Dan Keating and Mo Heckscher, before prevailing with 10/15, 15/10, 15/4, 15/9 scores.

In addition to the exciting matches which drew an enthusiastic gallery, the food and entertainment over the weekend were excellent, thanks to tournament director Bob Hicks and his committee.

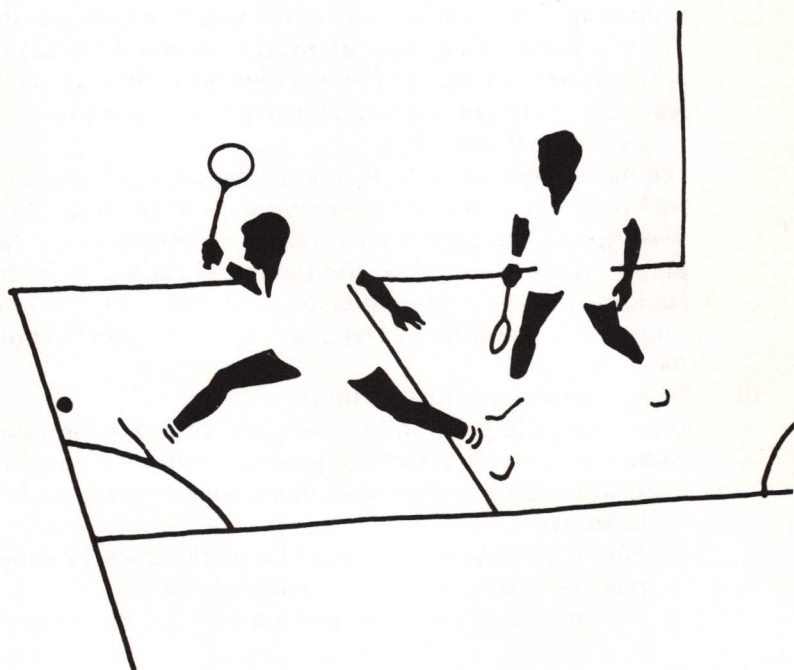

JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

I Program

The Junior Program for the first time took place at Towson State University and we originally planned for 10 - 12 sessions between the period of September 29th through December 5th. The Saturday morning sessions were planned for two hours from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. with the instructors being Frank Cushman, Peter Wolff, Donald Townsend and Randolph Torr. Each participant was assessed \$25.00 with the maximum fee being \$50.00 for any family having three or more children in the program.

II Activities Accomplished

We had twenty participants active in the program ranging in ages from 13 - 18. There were 12 girls and 8 boys.

While the sessions were intended for only two hours they inevitably lasted for two and a half hours, which was the maximum amount of time allowed by Towson State. In addition to the extended time allowed by the University, they were also very generous in allowing our group to participate two additional Saturdays.

We had several away trips, one of the most popular ones to McClean, Virginia and Mercersburg, Pennsylvania. On these two trips all the participants were encouraged to go. Advanced players were escorted on the trips to Philadelphia for the National Juniors and were taken to Washington, D.C. for the tournament sponsor by National Capital Squash Racquets Association.

III Recommendations for the future

In initiating the program, working the program through and in discussing the aspects of the program with all the participants, there were some recommendations which we felt should be made known:

1. That Frank Cushman should be working with the better players to develop better playing skills.
2. We should obtain more playing time for those who desire it.
3. I feel we should encourage one or two private schools to initiate some type of High School program.

4. We are currently looking to the possibility of a tournament program within our own Junior Association.
5. One of the major points is that we need active help from those people involved in the program.

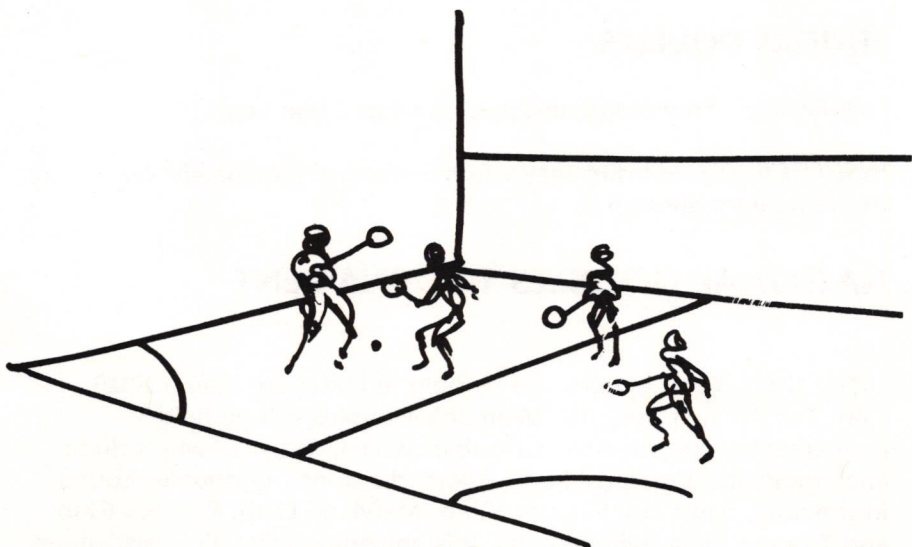

HOW TO PREPARE A DRAW

Seeding

One person can be seeded for every four players entered in the tournament. It is not necessary to seed the maximum. The basis of seeding should be the current rankings and up-to-date playing results which can be obtained from the USSRA Office upon request. The positioning of the seeds in the draw is as follows:

In a 32 draw:

Seed #1 is placed on the top line (line 1).
Seed #2 is placed on the bottom line (line 32).

Seeds #3 and #4 are placed in the center (lines 16 and 17) as determined by the toss of a coin.

Seeds #5, #6, #7, and #8 are placed on the top lines of the second and fourth quarters (lines 8 and 9) and on the bottom lines of the first and third quarters (lines 24 and 25). Places are determined by the toss of a coin. However, seeds #5 and #6 must end up in opposite halves of the draw as must seeds #7 and #8.

Placing (Optional)

For every seeded player, a player may be placed on the opposite side of the section from the seed. It is not necessary to place the maximum. Placing can be used when a tournament director feels that there is a distinct group of players, after the seeds, that warrant positioning advantage. The group of players should first be determined and then randomly placed.

Qualifiers

If there are more entrants than places in the draw (a draw usually being 16 or 32 or a power of 2), qualifying rounds may be held to pare down the field to the necessary number. For example, if there are 18 players entered in a 16 draw, then the two extra entrants will require two qualifying matches of two players each—or four players. The winner of each match enters the main draw.

It is also possible to hold open a number of places in the main draw for qualifiers and to arrange a competitive format for such places. In this case, any number of qualifiers may compete for the openings. For example, if there are two places held open in the main draw and eight applicants, two mini-tournaments of four each can be held to reduce the qualifiers to two winners who will be placed in the open places in the main draw.

Byes

If there are fewer entrants than places in the main draw, then first round byes are given. In a draw of 32 with only 28 entrants, there will be four byes. The byes go first to the seeded players in order of seeding. Any additional byes are placed working from the outside towards the center of the draw and alternating top and bottom halves—lines 4, 29, 6, 27, 12, 21, and 14 respectively.

Making the Draw

Place the #1 and #2 seeds. Toss a coin for placement of the #3 and #4 seeds. Toss a coin for placement of #5, #6, #7 and #8 seeds. Keep in mind that the #5 and #6 seeds as well as the #7 and #8 seeds must end up in opposite halves of the draw. The balance of the entries, *including any qualifiers*, are drawn randomly and placed. If the names of the qualifiers are unknown at the time of the draw, identify them as "Qualifier A", "Qualifier B", etc.

The sample draw is for 32 entrants. For a 16 draw, seed only 4 players, place accordingly, and proceed with the draw, qualifying rounds or byes using the same principle as for the 32 draw. For a 64 draw, 16 players may be seeded and placed along the same principles.

TOURNAMENT DIRECTOR'S DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES

Generally, the Second Vice President shall serve as the Chairman of the Tournament Committee. The Tournament Director of each MSSRA Tournament shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Tournament Committee and approved by the Executive Committee. He or she shall be responsible for the overall management of the tournament and insure that the tournament is operated in accordance with USSRA Rules and Regulations and MSSRA policies and procedures.

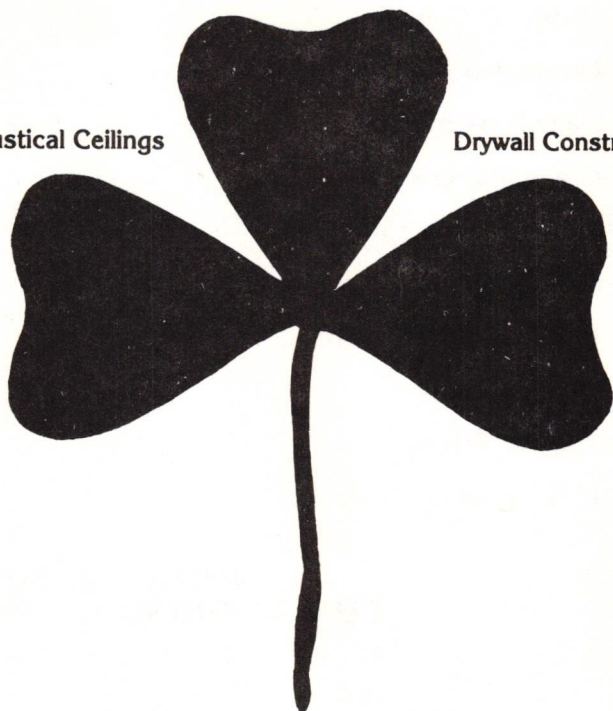

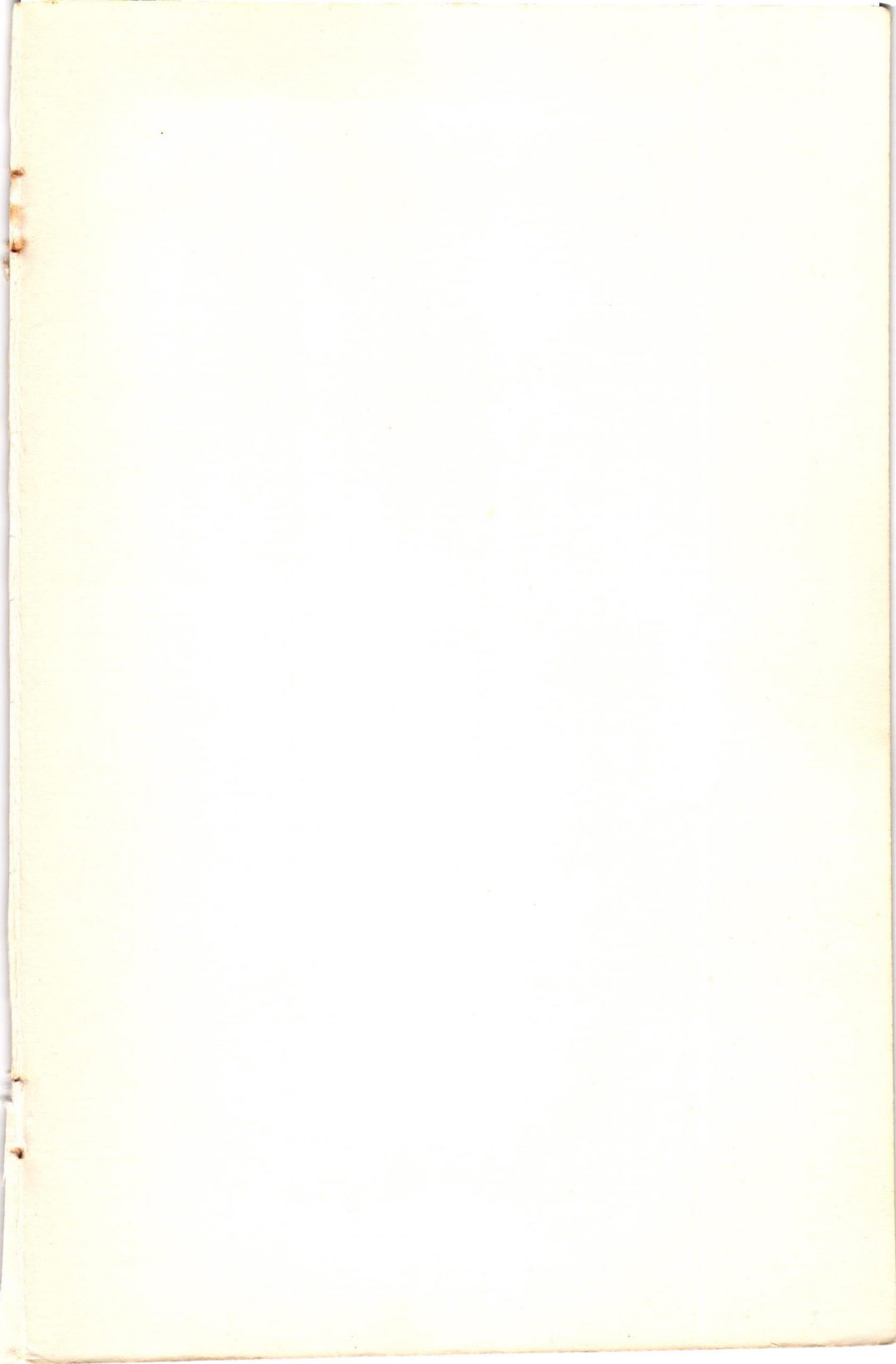
