With a year's experience in bringing order to our tournament procedures, we hope that events will go more smoothly than ever.

New Executive Committee member Fred Steinmann has agreed to chair a new Membership Committee to ease the load on the Treasurer and to see that all squash players in the area know of the benefits of belonging to MSSRA. It is refreshing to see many new members becoming involved in the operation of our association. We welcome them and remind the old-timers that there's room for everyone who wants a part of the action.

The Cooley Center became increasingly prominent in MSSRA activities Drawing upon the this past year. reservoir of squash talent among the students, faculty, hospital staff and employees of the Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions, the center's players made strong showings in individual tournament play and interclub team play. Also, the Cooley Center helped host various tournaments, with the support of center coordinators Jake Jacobs and Dan Rice. Mary McGuirk continued offering private instruction and squash classes. And the center continued sponsoring a squash ladder and club tournaments.

Rod Owens was the MSSRA State Singles B Champion. In doubles, the team of Sukon Kanchanarska and Jan Markowitz were C flight finalists in both the Fall Doubles and MSSRA Doubles.

The Cooley Center Squash Team won the interclub league champion-ship, with a ranked roster of Rod Owens, Rob Blaustein, Stu Selonick, Nick Suite, Jim Campbell, Dave Echelman, and Paul Murray. Although the team got off to a shaky start, their play

improved towards the end, making a strong showing in the playoffs. finals was against the team with the best win-loss record, the Johns Hopkins Homewood Team, with a ranked roster of Sukon K., Jan Markowitz, John Bunker, Rick Miller, and Bruce Simons-Interestingly, 4/5 of these players are also Cooley Center members. The Cooley Center helped host the National Women's B Tournament, which was very successful. Their final two matches came on a Friday preceding the Penn Round Robin tournament held on a February Saturday at the Ringe squash courts at the University of Pennsylvania. The Lady Jays lost soundly to the U of Penn B team, but then bounced back to beat

and appreciate each court



Let's not forget the doubles court with Bill, Tom, Rep and Lou and sitting in the sauna sipping a little brew


Yes, the members are the most unique but we cannot name them all so join us at "the palace" and you'll really have a ball




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SQUASH!

Squash has suddenly gone public. Since 1973 the number of squash courts in the United States has doubled. Over five hundred thousand Americans now play the game regularly. Tournaments involving United States players appear on network television. Squash has left its elitist closet and become a truly popular sport.

This upsurge in popularity began with the recent recreation boom, when the search was on for agreeable forms of vigorous exercise. Investors began to offer a wide variety of facilities for participation sports. Even the most avid jogger or tennis player yearns for variety, and squash can provide it, day or night, rain or shine, winter or summer.

Until recently, newcomers to squash were intimidated by the way the ball behaved. Before the summer of 1977, "American" squash was played with a hard, fast-moving, solid rubber ball. Exceptional quickness was required to hit the hardball. Considerable strength was necessary to play that game effectively. The hardball alone was sufficient to deter most women who tried the game, and all but the most committed of males usually chose a less daunting form of exercise.

The United States Squash Racquets Association, responding to pressure from all sides, abandoned the hardball, and "American" squash is now played with a hollow "70-plus" rubber ball. It is softer, bounces higher, weighs less,

and travels more slowly than its predecessor. Accordingly, the new squash game is easier for the beginning player. Rallies tend to last longer, as the ball is easier to return, and a short squash game now has an even greater exercise value. The risk of injury on the squash court – marginal though it was – has been reduced.

The streamlined and fashionable sport which squash has become is the most recent incarnation of a traditional four-wall racquet game with a long, venerable history. While its origins are somewhat uncertain, it seems that toward the end of the eighteenth century, inmates of the Fleet Prison in London bashed a ball around outdoors in the prison vard. News of the matches at Fleet spread, and bevies of society folk came to watch. The spectators were fascinated by the novelty of the game, and they recognized its potential as a vigorous, though decorous, activity for voung men.

"Rackets" were born, and somehow found its way to the Harrow School. It arrived between 1815 and 1820. The only real difference from the original prison game was that rubber, rather than wood, began to be used for the balls. There were only a handful of places at Harrow suitable for rackets – "The Corner" was the favorite – and as the century progressed and the game took hold, they were in almost constant use. Pupils eager to improve their skills

at rackets when the courts were busy devised a softer ball that was less likely to damage school property when used outside the designated areas. The version of rackets played with the softer ball put more emphasis on physical conditioning and mental discipline. This alternative game came to be known as squash.

In 1850, rackets or "harder" was given a separate home when two roofless courts were especially constructed for it. Squash and rackets now had distinct identities. In 1864, the process was completed with the building of the first four squash courts. The school's administrators promoted squash at the expense of rackets for reasons that still apply. More students got more exercise more safely in a smaller space for less money. Apart from the scoring system and the common concept of an indoor, four-wall racquet sport, the two games wound up miles apart.

A rackets court measures 60 by 30 feet, the squash court 32 by 18½ feet. The floor of a rackets court is usually stone, a squash court's wooden. Rackets court walls are black and unplastered, squash court walls white and plastered. The rackets racquet is bigger and stronger, and hits a solid white ball, rather than a softer green one with air in it. Rackets is a hazardous game of great speed which requires fast reflexes and highly developed racquet skills, but very little strategy. Squash is much more civilized, and when it got started, rackets went back to the woods.

By the 1890's, squash had found its way to America, and taken hold in parallel American institutions: private schools, Ivy League colleges, and exclusive university clubs. From its introduction in the United States, squash was established as an elitist gentleman's

game.

Over the next twenty years, squash developed separately on both sides of the Atlantic. The American game. which retained more of the elements of traditional "rackets," bore less and less resemblance to the English game. In 1907, the United States Squash Racquets Association was formed, and in 1929, the English Squash Rackets Association (later the International Federation) followed. The natural development of squash was halted, and each side became entrenched in defense of a quite different version of the same The die was cast - and the possibility of international squash competition was precluded for neary fifty vears.

The game's commercial potential was first grasped in England after World War II. A parallel growth began later in American, culminating in the arrival of the new ball. It has opened doors to an even wider public, and to the possibility of some rapprochement between the International Federation (for the English ball) and the American authorities. Unfortunately, each side is still at the stage where meaningless traditions of separate administration are objects of pride. Money and public interest may eventually cure what is left of the schism, but the rift thus far remains. For the time being, the 70-plus ball is harder and faster than the English one, but it shares many more of its characteristics than did its predecessor. Now, at last, players of all levels can be successful with both balls.

Squash's privileged background is one of the keys, perhaps, to its unique appeal. There is a noble tradition of fair play, which is still upheld. It is bad form to take any unfair advantage in squash – to yell at your opponent, the

referee, or even yourself. Physical contact, apart from a blithe handshake before and after the match, is not part of the game. It is an art to disguise all trace of emotion from our oppoenent while you're playing, but always remain courteous. So squash is the perfect game not only for competitors but also for those looking for a congenial form of exercise. Whether you win or lose, you'll always have the satisfaction of a good workout knocking a little rubber ball about.

Because of its great subtlety and constantly changing aspect, squash, like any other great sport, can be seen as an allegory of life, and this, in part, accounts for its compulsive quality. It has been called "chess for athletes" with some justice.

These niceties aside, your only obligation is to enjoy the game, for whatever reason and at whatever level you play. The only formalities are the booking of a court and the finding of an opponent. If you are a member of a club, you can usually arrange a game in two short phone calls. Squash, as played in cities these days, is streamlined to such an extent that a half hour of vigorous playing at lunchtime, which provides at least a day's worth of exercise, can still leave you time for a sandwich.

On the other hand, if you want to hang around after the game to grumble about your backhand, you'll have plenty of opportunity. Squash players usually can't say enough about each other's form – few of them can adequately express their theories on the court, which leaves plenty of material for the locker room.

Through all this there is the feeling of tradition, of inheriting a game that has had its heroes, its performances, to

which the current generation may aspire. This is not a game such as racquetball, deliberately simplistic, imposed upon society according to a businessman's carefully contructed formula. Squash has an idiosyncratic beauty, a noble past, and an exciting future. Now is the perfect time to begin the game. Squash represents the best of city life, constructed for you to take only what you want from it. It is available to everyone, young and old, men, women and children. Kanchanaraksa beat Don Olsavicky in his semifinal while Riehl bested Jan Markowitz.



English Ball Tournament "C" Champion John Riehl IV and Finalist Sukon Kanchanaraksa







Proceeds from the tournament went to the Maryland Special Olympics.









In the A flight, the #2 seeded team of Jim Hense and his veteran partner Joe Lacy proved to be too strong by defeating the uncle and nephew team of Bill and Doug Rice in the finals. Lacy's lobs and steady play coupled with Hense's hard cross courts and good gets kept the Rice duo in control by 15-3, 15-12, 15-11 scores.

The Hense-Lacy tandem defeated John Menton and his new partner Jim Tillman in their semis, 18-14, 9-15, 15-6, 15-12. In the other semi, the Rices beat out the #1 seed and current State Champs Joe Fitzpatrick and Jack Luetkemeyer, 15-11, 17-18, 15-9, 18-14.


In the B's, Bob Kent and Tim Schweizer had a seesaw tussle against John Riehl IV and Don Townsend. 
first game 11-15. Voneiff and Rice went on to steamroller Goodyear and O'Malley in a 3-0 victory for the B title.

1983 Maryland State Singles Championships

On the weekend of February 4-6, 97 entrants competed in the Maryland State Singles Championships, with the finals hosted by the Baltimore Country Club. Competition was held in five divisions: Mens A through D and a Womens Open. Only three of the five flights found seeded players in the finals.

In the women's flight, top seeded Mary McGuirk dominated play through the finals where she defeated Laurie Stieff in straight games.

The men's D flight had the top two seeds, Matt Polk and Brian Chasney, in the finals. Though the final match score was 3-1, the play was much tougher. With Chasney winning the first game 15-7, Polk won the next three by 15-12 scores.

The men's C flight proved to be the most surprising with two unseeded players, John Bunker and Kerry Tenberg, meeting in the finals. The first two games were highlighted by several long rallies and excellent gets. It wasn't until the last points of each game that Bunker rallied to win, 17-16 and 15-9. In the third game, changing his shot selection to more reverse corners and rail shots, Bunker caught Tenberg off guard and opened a commanding 9-2 lead and won the match in three games.

Don Townsend Jr. and Rod Owens provided some of the best play of the tournament in the men's B final. Townsend, the 1982 Maryland State C Champion, defeated the number one and three seeds to reach the finals. Out of action earlier in the season due to an

injury, he displayed aggressive play and is fast becoming a dominant squash player in this region. Owens, a medical student, was playing in only his first tournament of the season, having played club squash as an undergraduate at Penn State. In the earlier round, both players gained confidence and sharpened their games. In the finals, with the score tied at one game apiece, the third game proved to be the turning point. Following several early lead changes, Townsend saw a 12-8 lead disappear, following four unanswered points by Owens. Townsend, again, saw a 14-12 lead disappear as Owens sent the game into overtime at 14, and then won in the overtime. The fourth game followed a similar pattern with Owens winning the match in four games.

Sandy Martin, for the second consecutive year, successfully defended his claim to the A championship. The surprise was the return of Bill Rice to the finals after an absence of several years. To reach the finals, he defeated the second seed, Jim McCaslin. But, in the end, it was Martin's racquet control and shot selection that enabled him to win handily in straight games.


have a tough five gamer with Jim Tillman and Jim McCaslin, while the Rice duo handled the team of Tom Greene and Jervis Finney in a four gamer.






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

Once again, Baltimore played host for this exciting, ever-growing tournament. Our tournament, the Mid-Atlantic Regional, combines those players from Maryland, Virginia and D.C. areas.

The Insilco Corporation sponsors this tournament with the aid of USSRA. For a racquet fee of \$3.00, all entries receive a T-shirt and the opportunity to play at their respective level of B, C or D at the local clubs. Local winners receive engraved silver trays and move to regional play. 



The first-seeded Boston team of veteran Tom Poor and Harvard undergraduate Brad DeSaulniers defeated the second-seeded Buffalo pair, Charlie Jacobs and Marc Reinhardt, to win the 1983 Baltimore Invitational Doubles in four games, 15-12, 14-18, 15-8, 15-10. Poor's steady play and blistering cross-court pressure married well with his young partner's often spectacular retrieves and dazzling corner shots and boasts.

This was the year of the "odd couple" for this traditional tournament, now in its fifth decade of attracting the best of the Nationals-bound amateur circuit, along with a hard core of regulars from the pro ranks. With a number of the perennial contenders away on vacation and some other permanent realignments, the pairings represented an interesting array of "mix-and-match," and a handicapper's dream. A large slate of 21 teams required 5 initial rounds, providing a lively round of play and spectating for 5 hours Friday evening.

In the semis, Poor-DeSaulniers defeated (15-9, 15-8, 15-9) Pittsburghers Charlie Stewart and gil Mateer, who performed admirably as a "pick-up" team in the absence of vacationing regular partners Jack Baizley and Diehl Mateer. Meanwhile, Jacobs-Reinhardt topped Philadelphia's Scott Ryan and Baltimore local favorite Sandy Martin, 15-10, 15-12, 10-15, 15-6.

The quarter-finals saw the ultimate winners take New York's Niko and Tony Elmaleh in three, with Stewart-Mateer topping the young but promising team of Steve Fortunato, of New York,

and Phil Barth, of Buffalo, 3-0. Ryan-Martin stopped veteran New Yorkers Bart McGuire and John Murphy in three close games, while the Buffalo finalists overcame George Maguire, of Philadelphia, and Jay Umans, of New York, in a tenacious 3-1 contest.

The singles draw consisted of eight top singles players from in and out of town, paired against eight first-round doubles losers. Ironically, the finals pitted doubles partners and Yale varsity teammates Will Carlin and Hugh La-Bossier against each other in a rugged five-game slug-fest in which Carlin prevailed, 15-7, 12-15, 15-9, 15-18, 15-11. He had previously dispatched San Antonio's Randy Kahn in the semis (3-0) and last year's singles champ Chip Lindquist, of Pittsburgh, in the quarters (3-1). LaBossier took Philadelphian Dell Steinmann 3-0 in the semis, and Baltimore vet Jim McCaslin 3-1 in the quarters.





Congratulations to this years champions and best of luck in next years tournaments.





WOMEN'S SQUASH

Baltimore's women players started the 1982-83 season with three marriages (Nancy Taylor/Frank Cushman, Toby Gordon/Bruce Kaup and Laurie Stieff/Steve Kelly) followed by one pregnancy (Nancy Cushman) and later in the season, an engagement (Kay Fowler/Eric Dressler). It's a wonder we had any energy left to play squash!

Quite the contrary. Thanks to the efforts of many individuals, we had an enthusiastic and exciting squash season. Our goal was to attract as many new players as possible and to get the old and the new players to play tournaments.

To acomplish this we (1) created a Maryland State Women's Squash Ladder where players were encouraged to challenge one another, (2) distributed a Women's Squash Newsletter call *Tinbits* to all MSSRA women players and to the various squash clubs; (3) organized a series of in and out-of-state round robins and squash clinics; (4) developed a structure of club representatives (one at each club) to organize activities and

encourage play.

Our efforts seemed to have paid off. The State Ladder allowed different levels of players to challenge one another, and encouraged non-tournament players to get more involved in competition. The newsletter and club representatives kept people informed of tournaments and special events and the round robins enabled players to play individuals outside of their own clubs.

As a result, we attracted 12 new MSSRA members, maintained an active ladder of approximately 30 people, and developed a core of players who participated in both local and regional tournaments. We hosted the National Women's B Singles in which a core of Maryland women played. We took an entire C team, most of who had never participated before, to Howe Cup in New York and we even converted several hard core tennis buffs (notably Barbara Clements and Nancy Dunn) into squash fanatics.

All in all "it was a very good year". We hope to create as much enthusiasm and support next year as our base of players expands. Thanks to everyone who helped out and participated.

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Both Finalists Unseeded BOGEN IS NATIONAL WOMEN'S B CHAMPION

New Zealander Janet Bogen, now a resident of Philadelphia, won the fifth annual USSRA National Women's B Championship by defeating squash pro Jody Landis of Harrisburg in three straight games, 15-10, 15-8, 15-11. Both finalists were unseeded in the 28-player tournament held in Baltimore, March 18-20.

Bogen controlled the T throughout the final match, while Landis scrambled to the corners to retrieve her powerful rails and crosscourts. Landis, herself a very strong player, seemed undone by her own errors more than by Bogen's strategy, although Landis did confess that she was confused by Bogen's forceful two-handed backhand which effectively disguised many of her shots.

In the semifinal round, Bogen defeated #1 seed Carol Beer of New York in four games, 15-11, 12-15, 15-10 and 15-9. The one game captured by Beer was the only game Bogen lost in the tournament. In the quarterfinals, Bogen defeated Marty Zimmerman of New York 15-8, 15-3, 15-9. Her victims in earlier rounds were Karen Wynn of California (15-10, 15-9, 15-1) and Nunzie Gould of Maryland (15-6, 15-13, 15-3).

In her semifinal round, Landis defeated #2 seed Garcia Wood of Pennsylvania in three games, 15-2, 16-15, 15-12. Landis seemed to force errors from Wood by mixing up her shots, but emphasizing the short game. In earlier matches, Landis bested Elizabeth O'Brien of Wisconsin 15-12, 15-13, 15-8; Aloise Bates of Washington 7-

15, 16-14, 15-12, 15-11; and Pat Sogaard of California 15-8, 18-16, 15-9.

The play-off for third place between five-foot one-inch Beer and six-foot Wood was a close and pretty match between two finesse players. Wood won it 16-17, 15-7, 16-15, 17-16.

Fifth place in the tournament went to National Women's C Champion Laurel Ashley-Harmon of Michigan, who won the consolation feed-in after falling to Wood in the quarterfinals of the regular draw. Ashley-Harmon's opponent in the consolation finals was Linda Bowles of Illinois, who finished sixth.

If a Double-Rugged Squash-Comes-First Award were given, top contenders would have been Californian Vikki King and Trish Miller of Virginia. King imported a strange west coast virus – we'll forego a list of symptoms – but nonetheless made it through to the quarterfinals, where she lost to Carol Beer in five. Miller hitchhiked to her first match after her Daddy's Cutlass burned to a cinder on Interstate 95. Honorable Double-Rugged Mention goes to Miller's passenger, Susan Ridge.

The tournament, hosted by the Maryland State Squash Racquets Association, was run by former USSRA Women's Division President Margaret Riehl. She was ably assisted by Nancy Cushman and 1981 Women's B Champion Mary McGuirk. Court time was generously donated by the Denton A. Cooley Center at Johns Hopkins Hospital, the Racquet Club of Roland Park, and the Baltimore Country Club.

The BCC was the site of the excellent Saturday night dinner where the fiercest competition of the weekend took place, a no-holds-barred Joke War between tables. Paul Ellis contributed the one joke that was completely clean, and no one can recall it. Long-remembered will be USSRA Women's Division President Carol Weymuller's elephant joke, Carol "Little Red Riding Hood" Beer's napkin routine, and lastly, the reason they can't hear the stereo in California.





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



MARYLAND STATE RANKINGS 1983-1984

(At the conclusion of the 1982-83 Season)

Again this year we ranked and rated players in all singles divisions. A numerical system was used based on three tournaments: 70+Blue Dot, Baltimore City Open and Maryland State Tournament. Only MSSRA members

are ranked or rated.

Ranking Committee – Frank Cushman, Joe Lacy, Mary McGuirk, Don Townsend. Players may appeal to the ranking committee for a change in ranking.

In a typical round of sixteen – 1 point to enter, plus 1 point to first round winners, plus 2 points to quarterfinalists, plus 3 points to semifinalist, plus 4 points to winner. Thus, winner has total numerical value of 11 points semifinalist has 7 points, etc.

This year we used 3 tournaments – 70+ Blue Dot, Baltimore City Open and Maryland States. A double value is used for Maryland States.

In the event of a tie numerically, we look for head-to-head competition.

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
