



THE SOUTHEY MILES AWARD

Every now and then members of the squash community see fit to acknowledge the achievements of fellow players, past or present, who have left their special mark on the game. So it is that each year at the annual Invitational, Baltimore pays tribute to the singular accomplishments of one such legendary sportsman, the late Southey Miles, athlete, bon vivant and all around good fellow, by awarding a trophy in his name.

In light of the unique talents Southey displayed throughout the years, it is felt that he would heartily approve of this distinctive trophy which is given in recognition of bad deportment and outrageous acts committed during the weekend festivities.

For some years the award was known as the "Carter B. Simone Award: Baltimore Chapter," named for a Philadelphia non-player who regularly attended every major (and some minor) tournaments without ever seeing a game. Unfortunately, his enthusiasm for squash wasn't equal to his thirst, so he never left the bar.

After Southey's untimely death in 1973, Baltimoreans realized they had had their own celebrity in the field of roguish behavior since Southey had easily won the local Simone award five times in twelve years. It was then decided by the committee to henceforth bestow the illustrious trophy in his name. Winners were announced at the Sunday brunch before the finals of Baltimore's Invitational Doubles Tournament, but no actual trophy was presented in full knowledge that no one would have courage enough to arrive home with physical evidence of such errant activities. However, in 1979 an appropriate trophy, a crumpled, gilded beer can on a pedestal, no less was donated with all past winners' names enscribed. New winners are added each year and a photograph of the trophy (thoughtfully small enough to be hidden from an absent husband or wife) is presented. Past winners read like a "who's who" of great squash players and outstanding topers of this or any other age.

It is significant that no trophy was awarded in 1980 or 1981, years which coincide with the end of the tournament's open bar policy. Before that, the entire Invitational was held at the now defunct University Club where a singles court behind the doubles court was transformed on Sunday afternoon. Naturally, this provided the necessary impetus to those staunch persons seeking to capture the prestigious award.

Every kind of adventure, running the gamut of broken bones, lewd dancing, an evening in jail, loss of clothing, laying on of hands and other assorted misdeeds, has been rewarded the trophy.

Early winners have been lost in the mist of time, some may even have escaped the committee's watchful eye, but the fame of known winners begins in 1958. A nostalgic review recalls the late Jack Morrison's consecutive wins in '58 and '59. 1960 was the first year for the redoubtable Southey, who went on to repeat the feat in '61, '63, '68 and '72. Tony Rytina slipped in for the '62 championship, to be followed by big George Doetsch in 1964. Philadelphians came to conquer: Henry Roehner, 1965; and past national squash champion, Howard Davis, an easy victor in '66 and '67. Southey again upheld Baltimore's honor in '68, and in '69 Jack Miller asserted himself to join the ranks of this elite band. Anil Nayar, then reigning national squash champion, won the 1970 trophy in a walk. 1972 and '73 saw the successive wins of Southey and Alice Miles, but it was no contest in 1974 when the late Joe Hahn attacked a chair in his room, broke an arm and clinched the title. The next year belonged to the indomitable Flo Lamble, to be followed in '76 by the irrepressible Pedro Baccalao. From 1977 to '79, we find fun-loving Madge Franklin, Dick Britt and Peggy Senft up to the high standards of competition.

The advent of the "pay as you go" bar in 1980 temporarily cramped the crowd's style and there were no qualified winners, proving they were less a sedate than a cheap group. As luck would have it, there was again a clear winner in 1982 when stouthearted Frank Riggs, seeing the wonderful tradition about to go by the boards, jumped in the breach and took the prize.

The Lady in Black walked away with the trophy in 1984. Good taste prohibits printing her qualifications here, but ask any male in attendance and her secret will be revealed. Leigh Cochran and Tom Miller were honored with the first "Joint Award" in 1985 for their unique dancing style.

The lack of a winner in 1986 inspired Keen Butcher and Jeff Stanley to victory in 1987. This Princeton pair were admirable ambassadors to the game as they took it upon themselves to spread the word of squash. The fact that their chosen forum was the hot tub of a "temporarily" estranged housewife, shall not diminish their deeds.

All who knew Southey believe that this award is a fitting and warm tribute to a man who lived life to the utmost and enjoyed all the pleasures it had to offer. We hope he is up there rooting the next winner home.
