



- 2. Double check and assume personal responsibility for all main draw, consolation, and refereeing assignments.
- If unforseen problems arise that affect your participation, please immediately contact the appropriate tournament official. This will minimize the inconvenience to everyone involved and protect the integrity of the tournament results.

After the Tournament

- Thank everyone who helped out.
- 2. Remember all the good things that happened.
- 3. Look forward to playing in and/or helping out with the next one.

BALTIMORE CITY OPEN SUCCESS

or years the Baltimore City
Open has been one of
Maryland's major squash events,
and the 1994 tournament was no
exception. While the number of participants at the event was down
from past years (perhaps due to the
recent staging of the Nationals in
Baltimore), the play was superb.

One of the highlights of the event, hosted by the Meadow Mill Athletic Club, was an exciting exhibition match between Mark Talbott and Marty Clark. The match, sponsored by Prince, provided a great learning experience for both tournament players and novices. They could not only watch some exceptional play, but also ask questions of Talbott and Clark when they came off court after each game. With food and beer donated by Tombstone Pizza and Bond Distributing, all the ingredients were there for a great time.

In the 10 player Men's A draw, there was much speculation as to whether Don Townsend, after a hiatus from squash, would continue to dominate play locally. Englishman Nick Kyzer, the new pro at the host club, handily won the first game of the final with some inventive shot making. But Townsend's fitness proved a factor as Kyzer tired and began making unforced errors, thus allowing Townsend to win the next

three games and match.

Townsend's toughest test came in the semifinal round where David Bennett fought hard for five games before succumbing 9-3, 3-9, 9-3, 6-9, 9-1. Kyzer, by contrast, had a much easier time in the semis where he demolished Terry Hindermann.

Youth and fitness prevailed in the final of the Men's B flight when top seed Andy Parker squared off against Ken Katz, Meadow Mill's owner. After a grueling two days of play, the evenly matched players went 10-9 in the first, but then the less-fit Katz faded and Parker claimed the title 10-9, 9-4, 9-3. Both Parker and Katz needed four games to come through the semifinal round as Parker topped Meadow Mill publicist Hugh Anderson and Katz outpointed second seed Kamal Husain of Washington, D.C., 4-9, 9-2,9-3, 10-9. Anderson upset another player from Washington, No. 3 seed Mike Pak, in a five game quarterfinal contest. The No. 1 seed also earned top honors in the Men's C flight. Dan Nichols didn't drop a game in his four matches, with his final round victory coming over local player Howard Goldfarb, Goldfarb, the No. 4 seed, played well to reach the final though, as he beat Barry Rollins in the semifinals in four games after surviving a five game battle with Jeff Ignall.

Of special note, Denise Lipinski, one of Baltimore's top women players, made the final of the consolation in Men's C against David Cooke and fell in five long games. She was beaten in the first round of the 10-9 main draw 9-2, 8-10, 8-10, 10-8 by lason Weinstock

champion's trophy in the Men's D flight as he toppled Mitch Rogers in a 3-0 final. Miller upset top seed Bob Gaines in a four game semifinal while Rogers, a well-coached ex-racquetball player who was competing

Virginian Dave Miller took the

in his first event, beat Greg Jenkins 3-0. Rogers outlasted the No. 2 seed, Brian DeFrancesca, 5-9, 9-4, 6-9, 9-8, 9-0, in the first round.

The Women's draw saw Teresa Burch earn the crown by recording a 1-9, 9-1, 9-4, 9-1 victory over Kate Knott in the final.

Special thanks were extended by the organizers to the out-of-state players who attended. They were assured that they can count on the same level of excitement for next year's tournament.

FIFTY TEAMS PLAY IN BALTIMORE FALL DOUBLES

ver fifty teams played in the 15th annual Baltimore Fall Doubles Tournament help from 12/7/94 through 12/16/94. The Class "A" Division was wide open since Ira Miller's partner, Doug Rice came up lame after helping Baltimore win their first Ketchum Cup in Philadelphia the previous weekend.

Ira teamed up with Veteral Bob Barton to reach the finals against Pat Miller and John McColl, former state champions. The final lasted over two hours with Pat and John taking top honors by a (12-15), 15-10, 1510, (13-15), 15-12 count.

Bob Barton saw most of the action and was happy that it was a Friday evening final so he could rest over the weekend. On their way to the finals, Pat and John ousted last year's runners-up, John Riehl and Dirck Bartlett in four semi games, after earlier handling Jim Taylor and Geoff Kennedy also in four.

Ira and Bob took four games to top John Bremermann and Tim Chisolm in their semi, following their quarters 3-1 victory over Ben Knox and Nat Otis.



The "B" Flight proved to be most competitive. Bruce Matthai and Angus Burton took this crown defeating Neil Sandson and Bob Everd in three 18-16, 15-13, and 15-12.

The winners path to the finals was hard fought with three 3-2 victories in the semis, quarters, and preliminary founds. Their semis over Bruce Preston and Ken Katz, quarters over Dave Barklay and Bruce Rankin and prelim over Hunter Cochrane and Charlie Peterson.

Everd/Sandson's trip to the finals was somewhat easier knocking off top seeded Brian Effinger and Tom Riehl in the quarters (3-1), then ousting Kin Yellott and Bruce lackson also by a 3-1 semi score.

Hunter Cochrane and Charlie Peterson won the "B" Conso over Dave Huntley and John Brush.

The "C" group had 21 teams competing in it. The Baltimore Country Club team of John Kemp and John Grill topped Meadow Millers Bo Cashman and Mason Flynn 15-11, (7-15), 17-14, and 15-10. Their caliber paly of squash was superior for "C" level squash. In the end, Cashman and Flynn were just short on experience in losing to Kemp and Grill who have played together for years.

Kemp and Grill toppled Bruce Smith and Bill Reinhoff in a four game semi after earlier getting by Courtney Jenkins and Turner Smith. In the bottom half, Cashman and Flynn won four matches to reach this final. Their semis and quarters were over Maryland Clubbers Dave Clinnin and Gordon Gannon and Tom Rielly and Barry Strudwick respectiveley. Both were four games.

The "C" conso round was captured by Brian Swanson and Peter Brinch over Hugh Anderson and Harry Rogers.

The Veterans draw featured the surprise entry of Frank and Nancy Cushman who made it to the finals before being shut down by Sandy Martin and Charlie Fenwick in four extrememly well-played games, 15-12, 15-13, (12-15), 15-7.

The Martin/Fenwick duo took John Bremermann and John McColl in three semi games, while Frank and Nancy had a 3-0 match over Joe Fitzpatrick and Bob Travers. Earlier, the husband and wife tandem took John Menton and Rich Thomas, also in three.

The Ladies draw lost their #1 seed Patrice Cromwell and Anita McMullen due to an unfortunate death in Patrice's family. This left the field wide open. Liz Everts and Steph Johnson claimed Victory over Timmi Wolff and Denise Lipinski. Vaughan Schmidt and Mary Alice Hense came in third place.

1995 BALTIMORE SENIORS AND MASTERS DOUBLES TOURNAMENT

This year's event featured many new faces in the 12th annual Baltimore Senior and Masters Doubles Tournament, held the first weekend in February. Two unseeded teams reached the finals of the Seniors Division.

John Menton and Jim Hense of Baltimore eventually won in a long five-gamer over Bernie Halfpenny and Leo Pierce of Philadelphia.

Menton and Hense took the first two games 15-9, 15-11 and leading 13-8 in the third only to lose that game 17-16. They dropped the fourth by a 15-9 count before their first Seniors crown. Early in the match, Menton's steadiness and Hense's power proved to be a wining combination before Leo and Bernie found out how to slow the pace down with drops and lobs, but in the end, John and Jim picked up the pace on the way to their victory.

The Menton-Hense semi proved to be another close five gamer over Helmut Meertz and John Fuller, the defending champions. In this match they were also up 2-0 in games, 17-13 in the third, but lost five match points, losing 18-17. Helmut and

John easily took the fourth game 15-9 setting the stage for the deciding game. This game marked good gets, a few lets and excellent play with John and Jim winning by a 17-14 count, close to a two hour match.

The Halfpenny-Piece tandem easily took their semi in straight games over Tony Shepherd and Jim Hand.

Earlier action saw Menton and Hense handle both Frank Reidy and Gary Wilmore (phila..) and Jim Young and Chuck Kelly (Boston) in straight games, while Halfpenny and Pierce had a somewhat surprising 3-1 win over A.C. hubbard and Jack Luetkemeyer (Balto.) in their quarters, after taking fellow Philadelphians Will Dubin and Dave Vahising in three.

The other quarters went as follows: Meertz-Fuller over Bill Bruchey and tournament Chairman Bob Everd 3-1. Jud Hand-Tony Shepherd squeaked by Alan Zeigler-Paul Thomas (NY) in five well-played games.

MIXED DOUBLES

n its fourth year, this event has shown continued improvement in the caliber of play. Nineteen teams played in the open division with the four seeded teams dominating. As a group they lost only one game through the quarters. Then one team showed its dominance. The number one team of Frank and Nancy Cushman closed the semi and finals with 3-0 wins.

In the semi's Peter George and Patrice Cromwell attacked with power. Both hit hard rails and Peter tried to blow his cross courts past Nancy on the right wall. The problem was the excellent combination between the husband and wife duo. Each time Nancy was passed, Frank would be in position to easily retrieve the ball.

Second seeded Patrick Miller and Anita McMullen earned their final slot by beating Lissen and Ron Tutrone. Their victory was more easily earned. Pat, a former finalist, and Anita, a former champion, controlled the ball throughout. Lissen's stamina was tested. She had given birth to her and Ron's second child only a few weeks before.

In the finals Pat and Anita streaked to a quick 9-3 lead. Steady play, Nancy's quick hands and Frank's drop shots changed the tide. Nancy and Anita worked the hardest. They were fencing with one another throughout. Each looking for the opening to score a cross court lob kept Nancy deep. Frank seemed to own all the front wall nicks. (As a matter of fact, he does. The tournament headquarter, Meadow Mill, belongs to the Cushmans and Katzes). He was able to continue making straight and cross-court drops at will.

The B draw contained three husband and wife teams, one father and daughter team and a husband and wife playing with other partners. These last two players were strategically place in opposite ends of the draw.

Bruce and Cecily Mathai, playing together for the first time led the bottom half of the draw. Peter and daughter, Timmie Wolff, fell first, followed by Julie Miller and Angus Barton. In the semi's, Ben Knox and Liz Everts presented a strong, but not strong enough opposition.

The top half of the draw, Vaugn Schmidt recruited as a last minute fill in, former partner Jim Hense. The old magic was still there. They made it to the finals with wins over Jan Markowitz and Tara Dorr, David and Ann DeMuth and Don Townsend Jr. and tournament chairperson, Stephanie Johnson.

In the finals, Vaugn and Jim prevailed. Vaugn played her normal steady game that neutralized



Bruce's powers, while Jim's doubles experience prevailed on the right wall.

The quality of the teams in the "C" flight is evidenced by the fact that all but one of the consolation semi-finalists lost in five games. And the semi's and finals were five games. Bob Everd and Denise Lipinski, playing together for the third year, beat Sucheta Pandit and Bill Sheppard to win the title. Denise carried the team throughout the conso flight with powerful rails and hard straight drops. Throughout the tournament Bill had the respon-

sibility of getting the ball to the left wall. There Sucheta, new to the doubles game, exercised racquet skills. Her drops and lobs did not represent her newness to the game.

Father/daughter team of Peter and Timmie Wolff were defeated by the second place finisher. Host club owner, Ken Katz and partner Helen Marshall lost to Everd/Lipinski in a very close five game match.

"C" flight champions were Topper Webb and Ellen Remson. Four teams, all novice doubles players, formed a round robin.

THE MASTERS DIVISION

The Masters Division was again dominated by Charlie Stehle and Alan Deutermann. Their early round play saw them send Darwin Kingsley and Scott Fraser to the consolation. The newly formed team of Dick Will and Vince Laspina beat John Riehl and Chuck Winkelman before falling in the semis to Alan and Charlie.

In the lower half of the draw Alex Sotir who last year made it to the finals in the Seniors, teamed with old friend Jervis Finney. Their quarter round action was a win against Alfie Hunter and Bob Benis. In the semis, Jerry Fineberg and Joel Kozol played well but could not overcome Alex's right wall power.

Jerry and Joel, both first timers at

the Hicks, played well against Canadians Takie Doucas and Ernie Pilsworth in a fine 3-1 set, first round match.

There were three Legends (70+) teams. Play consisted of a round robin format. Howard Wilkens and John Weissenfluk suffered loses to both of the other competitors. Bob Hicks, tournament founder, teamed with John Johnson. Their opponents in the trophy round were John Miller and George Hallowell. John provided the wheels, George the shots. he 19th annual Maryland State Softball Championships were held at the Meadow Mill Athletic Club April 22-24.

In the Men's A flight Don
Townsend officially established
himself as the best player in
Maryland with a straight game victory over Dave Bennett. Don's speed
and strength are simply too much
for his fellow competitors.

Don Beat Alex Deitz of Bel Air 3-0 in one semi, and Mr. Bennett beat host pro Nick Kyzer in a gruelling 5-gamer that was the highlight of the tournament.

The Men's B saw the fluid style of Tej Paul Hundal prevail over local lacrosse legend Paul Huntley 3-1. Tej Paul got by the always tenacious Allen Tien, and Dave Beat rapidly improving racquetball convert Greg Mathis to get to the finals.

Greg Munoz (assistant tennis & squash pro at the Baltimore Country Club) outlasted a very capable Chris Schein in the C final. Greg simply ran down every ball to overcome an otherwise dominant Mr. Schein. Henry Franklin and Alan Eyre worked their way through the 22 man draw to lose in the semis to Chris and Greg respectively.

Azhar Khan beat fellow Penn Stater Dan Hymer in a well played and friendly match in the D final. Semi-finalists Jeff Ignall and Ryan Gill and numerous others wish them well in future C tournaments.

In the women's A Carol Grunberg (Wash. D.C.) proved too strong for Lisa Roy (Balt.). Both Carol and Lisa use an intelligent, consistent style of play. Superior court coverage and experience gave Carol a clear-cut victory in three.

Vaughan Easter edged out
Denise Lipinski in a see saw 5game battle for third place. Both
are talented athletes who will only
get better in the B flight. The aforementioned Denise Lipinski defeated Mary Alice Hense. Denise's
power and placement were too
accurate despite the quickness and

The C title went to Tara Dorr over Jill Litt (3-1) in a battle of former Johns Hopkins teammates. Tara's coolness under pressure enabled her to win the big points, like in her days as #1 for Hopkins. Jill's game is continually improving and will move up the ranks in the future. Another local favorite, Laurie Miller, took third place over Debbie Saltz.

In the men's 40s Riaz Arshad (Columbia, MD) bested Bob
Travers in four crisp games. Riaz's graceful, intelligent game is beautiful to watch. Bob (aptly nicknamed "Turbo") is a dynamo on the court. His game has improved steadily

over the years. His sportsmanship and hustle always make him a crowd favorite.

Gerd Petrick triumphed over Peter Wolff in the 50s flight. Gerd shamelessly uses cunning and guile to his best advantage. Peter battled gamely after a leg injury early in the match, but Gerd was simply playing too well to be overcome.

We gratefully acknowledge Prince, the tournament sponsor. Their contribution to the growth of squash was plainly evident in the dominant usage of Prince racquets and gear throughout the weekend. Thanks to Meadow Mill Athletic Club and Merritt Towson for making their courts available to us.

1994-95 MARYLAND STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 1994-1995 Maryland State Championships were held at Meadow Mill Athletic Club April 21-23. Host pro Nick Kyzer skillfully set up the draws and then watched them run smoothly throughout the weekend.

The A flight saw Frenchman Ben Desombre defeat 2-time defending state champion Don Townsend, Jr.

Don won the first game 9-1, and was leading in the second, when Ben slowly but surely raised the level of his play to win 10-8. Ben's fitness and lifelong softball experience then carried him through the next two games, 9-3 and 9-5 despite constant hustle and pressure from Don.

Don beat former BCC assistant pro Rob Krizak 3-1 in the semi-final while Ben deflated local favorites Dave Bennett and Nick Kyzer to make it to the final.

In the B flight Greg Mathis beat his sparring partner Chris Brown 3-0. After surviving overtime in the first game, Greg was simply too strong and steady to overcome. Greg's road to the final included 3-1 wins over Jason Phillips and Jock Rodgers. Chris had to work much harder with come from behind 5 game matches against Andy Parker and Rodney Herring.

Jeff Goldsmith is the state C champion by virtue of his 9-7, 8-10,

9-1, 9-6 triumph over Bruce Smith. Jeff is also an accomplished racquetball player and now enjoys playing squash and is rapidly moving up the ranks. Jeff defeated Barry Rollins in the semi-finals. Barry was probably a little tired from a great 5-game upset of top seed Jim Marino in the quarter-finals. Bruce defeated local players David Cooke and Jim Martin to reach the final.

Brewster Perkins won the state D over Courtenay Jenkins 9-3, 10-8, 2-9, 9-6. Brewster played well to win, but would be wise to avoid a rematch with the up and coming Mr. Jenkins. Courtenay beat Bob Gaines Jr. in the semis, while Brewster sneaked by Frank Knott in a gritty 5-gamer.

Riaz Arshad defended his title in the 40s with a 3-9, 9-6, 9-6, 9-1 victory over Hal Tenolce. Riaz's game is graceful and intelligent as well as skillful. Watching him play is a squash lesson it itself. Losing in the semi-finals were former state champ John Minkowski and the indefatiguable Cobber Eccles.

Dennis Bourke marched through the 50s draw without the loss of a game. The man refuses to act his age in any aspect of his squash life. Way to go kid! Jim Hense was the runner-up, giving Dennis his best match but unable to break through in a 9-6, 9-6, 10-8 loss. Longtime

he \$7.500 HEAD Grand Prix Pro-Am squash tournament was held at the Merritt Athletic Club in Towson in mid-October. As in the past two years. He was really never challenged throughout the tournament and his combination of impeccible racquet skills, strong movement, and remorseless concentration were just too much for all who stepped on court with him. In addition, he was the perfect professional — gracious, undemanding, and always ontime and perfectly prepared for competition. This young man is a

name to watch for in the future.
